Thomas Hussey owned/ran an ordinary (bar) at/in the courthouse before the courthouse was sold off in the 1720s. **James Maddox** (first son of Cornelius) was chosen by the county to buy the land (3 acres), since James already was running an inn nearby. It's likely that Hussey and James had at least a business relationship.
